GLOBAL IDEAS FOR U.S. SOLUTIONS: 2016 OPEN SOLICITATION

BACKGROUND

Throughout its history, the United States has learned from great ideas from abroad, from bagels to democracy. Why not do the same for health? In that spirit, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) is looking globally for ideas to help us build a *Culture of Health* in the United States, where everyone has the opportunity to live healthier lives, no matter who they are, where they live, or how much money they make.

We imagine a future where neighborhoods are designed with an eye toward physical activity and community engagement. Where health care providers focus on promoting wellness, not just treating illness. Where all sectors, from health care to social services to urban planning, work together with health in mind. This vision for the United States is a reality in many countries and communities around the world, and we want to learn from them.

If you have an idea that has worked abroad and has the potential to be adapted to work in the United States, we want to hear from you.

THE PROGRAM

We are looking for projects, programs, and models that promote health equity and are aligned with our Culture of Health *Action Framework*; this year, we have a particular interest in ideas that:

- Build healthy places;
- Build social connection across the lifespan;
- Get and keep children healthy;
- Integrate health and social services; and
- Increase the health care system's focus on the root causes of poor health.

We will give priority to approaches that have demonstrated impact but have not been widely tested or implemented in the United States.

TOTAL AWARDS

• We will support grants from \$50,000 up to \$250,000 (USD), for up to 18 months. The total number of grants is undetermined.

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- This funding opportunity will remain open for three months; however, decisions about modifications to the program and the duration of the program will be made by RWJF at its sole discretion.
- The grant opportunity outlined in this call for proposals is contingent upon final funding confirmation from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation for such grants.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

We are looking for applicants who represent organizations from a wide range of fields and disciplines—both within and outside the health sector. We seek to attract diversity of thought, professional background, race, ethnicity, and cultural perspective in our applicant pool. Building a Culture of Health means integrating health into all aspects of society, so we encourage multisector partnerships and collaboration.

We encourage proposals from both U.S.-based applicants with ideas for adapting an overseas model and international applicants with ideas that could work in the United States.

Please note:

- Applicants may be based almost anywhere in the world¹, but we are only interested in projects that have clear relevance or applicability to the United States.
- Awards will be made to organizations, not individuals, and preference will be given to applicants that are either public entities, public charities, or nongovernmental organizations.
- RWJF works with *Charities Aid Foundation of America* on grants to organizations located outside the United States. Additional information about the role of Charities Aid Foundation of America will be provided to organizations invited to submit full proposals.

DIVERSITY STATEMENT

Consistent with RWJF values, this program embraces diversity and inclusion across multiple dimensions, such as race, ethnicity, gender, disability, age, and socioeconomic status. We strongly encourage proposals from organizations that will help us expand the perspectives and experiences we bring to our work. We believe that the more we include diverse perspectives and experiences in our work, the more successful we will be as we strive together to build a Culture of Health, enabling all in our diverse society to lead healthier lives, now, and for generations to come.

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SELECTION CRITERIA

Proposals will be evaluated on the basis of:

- Fit with the topics described in this solicitation and the Culture of Health Action Framework;
- Clarity and importance of the project aims, framework, conceptual model or rationale that guides the design of the project;
- Qualifications, experience, and accomplishments of the proposed team;
- The degree to which the project is unique and different from previous efforts in the United States;
- Feasibility to implement, finance, and sustain in the United States, particularly considering cultural and financing differences between countries; and
- Appropriateness of budget and project timeline.

EVALUATION AND MONITORING

Grantees are expected to meet RWJF requirements for the submission of narrative and financial reports, as well as periodic information needed for overall project performance monitoring and management. We may ask project directors to participate in periodic meetings and give progress reports on their grants. At the close of each grant, the grantee is expected to provide a written report on the project and its findings suitable for wide dissemination.

APPLICANT SURVEY PROCESS

To help us measure the effectiveness of RWJF grantmaking and improve the grant application experience, we will survey the Project Director listed in proposals submitted under this call for proposals. Shortly after the proposal deadline, the Project Director will be contacted by Princeton Survey Research Associates International (PSRAI), an independent research firm, and asked to complete a brief, online survey about the proposal process and applicant characteristics. This voluntary questionnaire will take no more than 15 minutes to complete. Responses provided to PSRAI will not impact the funding decision for the proposals in any way.

PSRAI will protect the confidentiality of the responses. RWJF will not receive any data that links a name with the survey responses.

USE OF GRANT FUNDS

Grant funds may be used for project staff salaries, consultant fees, data collection and analysis, meetings, supplies, project-related travel, and other direct project expenses, including a limited amount of equipment essential to the project. In keeping with RWJF policy, grant funds may *not* be used to subsidize individuals for the costs of their health care, to support clinical trials of unapproved drugs or devices, to construct or renovate facilities, for lobbying, for political activities, or as a substitute for funds currently being used to support similar activities.

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HOW TO APPLY

Please submit a brief proposal; if there is interest in your idea, you will be asked for a more detailed proposal for further consideration.

Please note:

- All budget numbers must be in U.S. dollars, and the application must be written in English.
- Proposals will be reviewed by RWJF staff with the possibility of some external, independent reviewers. All funding decisions are made by RWJF.

Proposals for this solicitation must be submitted via the RWJF online system. Visit www.rwjf.org/cfp/global1 and use the Apply Online link. If you have not already done so, you will be required to register at http://my.rwjf.org before you begin the proposal process.

There are two phases in the competitive proposal process:

Phase 1: Brief Proposals:

Applicants must submit a brief proposal that describes the project and include a preliminary budget. Brief proposals will be reviewed on a rolling basis. Generally, applicants can expect to be notified of their status within 6 to 8 weeks of their submission.

Phase 2: Full Proposals:

Selected Phase 1 applicants will be invited to submit a full proposal accompanied by a detailed budget, budget narrative, and additional information.
