Application for 2018 BRSS TACS Capacity Building Opportunity

Overview

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) Bringing Recovery Supports to Scale Technical Assistance Center Strategy (BRSS TACS) is pleased to announce the **2018 Capacity Building Opportunity**, a free intensive technical assistance (TA) opportunity for peer-run organizations (PROs), recovery community organizations (RCOs), family-run organizations, and youth- and young adult-run (YYA) organizations. This intensive TA will be provided between February and August 2018.

We will determine participation through a review that SAMHSA BRSS TACS representatives will conduct to identify intensive TA needs that are not addressed by any other source, a balance of recovery organizations focused on mental health and substance use disorders, as well as geographic diversity.

Please note that previous recipients of the 2017 SAMHSA BRSS TACS Capacity Building
Opportunity are ineligible to apply.

Benefits

This opportunity will offer access to national experts and support to help expand your organization's knowledge, expertise, sustainability, and capacity to carry out its mission. It also provides opportunities to connect with and learn from other PRO, RCO, family-run, and YYA-run organizations facing similar challenges. The intensive TA will support implementing and sustaining activities to engage peer leaders from mental health and substance use treatment/recovery communities and help achieve state implementation plans to expand capacity for recovery support efforts.

Purpose

The 2018 BRSS TACS Capacity Building Opportunity will offer sustained, individualized consultation, training, and peer-to-peer support for up to 25 peer-run, recovery-community, family-run, and youth- and young adult-run organizations over the course of six months. National subject matter experts may offer virtual training and technical assistance, learning communities, webinars, products, and guidance on specific topics of interest to organizations that are committed to developing their own capacity in one of five areas below. For additional assistance in determining your potential focus area, please refer to the **TA Examples Table** directly below the following focus areas:

- 1. <u>Partnering With State Systems to Advance Recovery:</u> TA will assist organizations to better partner with state, territorial, or tribal behavioral health systems to advance recovery and integrate peers.
- 2. <u>Advancing the Peer and Family Support Workforce</u>: TA will support organizations as they continue to develop and strengthen their peer and family support workforce.
- 3. <u>Building Infrastructure and Organizational Capacity:</u> TA will assist organizations to strengthen their infrastructure and build their organizational capacity to enhance their ability to provide peer and family support services.
- 4. <u>Sustaining Recovery in Educational Settings</u>: TA will support organizations to develop and sustain recovery programs in educational settings.
- 5. <u>Supporting Re-entry:</u> TA will support organizations to address re-entry challenges experienced by individuals in or seeking recovery who are transitioning from criminal justice or institutional settings to life in the community.

Process

Participation in the BRSS TACS intensive TA opportunity is voluntary. TA delivery will consist of activities designed to reach agreed-upon goals and outcomes relevant to the shared goals of BRSS TACS and the recipient. TA delivery and participation will include monthly teleconferences and may also include virtual support as necessary. We will structure TA around sustained, ongoing relationships between the BRSS TACS TA team and selected PROs, RCOs, family-run organizations, and youth- and YYA organizations.

BRSS TACS will work with the TA recipient to create a customized TA package, which may include some combination of the following elements:

- webinars
- · staff trainings/professional development
- · virtual meetings
- support for data collection, validation, and reporting
- assistance in the development and revision of written processes and policies
- tools and templates
- resources
- · learning communities

For example, monthly webinars or learning community participation, phone support, and resources provided as needed may follow a training.

Roles and Responsibilities

The primary BRSS TACS TA task lead assigned to each individual category will

- negotiate and formalize activities between the BRSS TACS TA team and recipient organizations to achieve agreed-upon outcomes;
- co-create a TA plan with identified outcomes that is specific to the needs of organizations and results in measurable outcomes; and
- provide support as detailed in the TA plan through virtual assistance, phone calls, monthly web conferences, and e-mail communication.

The roles and responsibilities of participants will vary based on each organization's customized TA plan, but at a minimum each participant will

- · complete an organizational self-assessment;
- participate in co-creating a tailored TA plan with measurable outcomes;
- submit a signed letter of commitment to participate in the TA process;
- ensure leadership support from any organization involved in the TA;
- designate a single point of contact to facilitate communication with the TA provider;
- demonstrate willingness and readiness to addressing the area of need and commitment to the organizational change process;
- provide staff to collaborate in creating the TA plan and implementing the activities; and
- provide the staff and resources necessary to support the TA engagement and to assess organizational progress toward agreed-upon outcomes on a regular basis.

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Online Application

Eligibility

The 2018 Capacity Building Opportunity is available only to peer-run organizations (PROs), recovery community organizations (RCOs), family-run organizations, and youth- and young adult-run (YYA) organizations. The opportunity will provide up to 25 successful applicants with intensive technical assistance (TA) over a 6-month period (February - August 2018). We strongly encourage applicants to review the "Overview" information and the TA Examples Table before applying for the Capacity Building Opportunity.

Please Note: Previous recipients of the 2017 Capacity Building Opportunity are ineligible to apply.

Potential applicants are PRO, RCO, family-run or YYA nonprofit entities that meet the following requirements:

- A majority of consumers/peers/people in recovery must manage the applicant program or organization.
- The majority of the organization's board of directors or advisory board must identify as consumers/peers/people in recovery.
- The Board of Directors or Advisory Board must have been in operation for at least six months before the date of issuance of this subcontract announcement.
- The organization must be dedicated to promoting wellness and recovery for people with substance use disorders, mental health issues, or co-occurring mental and substance use disorders.

Instructions

To be considered for this opportunity, you must complete this application. You must start and finish the application at the same time, so we recommend that you compose your answers offline and copy and paste them into this Survey Monkey application.

We will make final decisions by <u>January 12</u>, <u>2018</u>. Organizations selected for the Capacity Building Opportunity need to participate in a kickoff teleconference on Monday, January 29, 2018.

We will provide a link to the TA request form in the email response informing you if you have not been selected to participate in the 2018 Capacity Building Opportunity.
